"Souper" Bowl Sunday Sunday, February 1

On Sunday, February 1, millions of sports fans will sit in front of a TV enjoying friendship and refreshments while watching the Super Bowl game. Ironically, during this same time, countless young children around the world will die because of malnutrition and preventable diseases. The effort began in 1990 by young people at a Presbyterian Church in South Carolina to transform the Super Bowl into a "Souper Bowl" for the needy. Since then congregations all over America have raised over \$100 million for soup kitchens, food banks and other charities in communities across the country. Last year alone, over \$8,420,000 was generated by 7,565 participating groups.

You are invited to join us in this effort. As you leave worship on the 1st, please give at least \$2 to the young people who will be holding soup pots. The monies collected will be given to the Food Pantries of the Presbytery of Detroit.

Ash Wednesday Dinner & Communion Wednesday, February 18

On February 18, starting at 6 p.m., there will be a dinner followed by a worship service marking the beginning of *Lent*. This evening will set the stage for our Lenten journey.

Reservations for the dinner can be made by calling the church by Monday, February 16. The cost for the dinner is \$10 for adults. For those unable to attend the dinner, the worship service, with the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, will begin at 7:15 p.m. in Dodge Hall.

Lenten Study "Parables & Passion"

What does *Lent* mean to you? For many, *Lent* is a time to give something up. While there is a place for self-denial and giving something up for Lent, it is also important for Christians to consider a special discipline during *Lent*. Whether it is incorporating daily Bible reading, prayer or devotional readings each of us should make a commitment to doing something for the 40 days of *Lent* to enrich our spiritual health and well-being.

One option is to participate in the church's six week *Lenten* Study. This year the study, led by Peter Smith, will focus on John Indermark's book, Parables and Passion. Participants will discover new insights about the passion story through the lenses of Jesus' parables. As Indermark writes, "Parables nudge us all to receptive insight". For those new to the Lenten journey, they give access to the holy through the ordinary. For those who have navigated this season many times, they allow an opportunity to experience *Lent* from a different perspective... [Parables] take us deeper, revealing the approaching realm of the God who has come to us in One who teaches still in parables." Through Parables and Passion you'll reflect on one parable each day of the season, one thematic chapter per week. The Prologue offers a reading for Ash Wednesday, while the Epilogue provides readings for the final days of Holy Week.

Open your eyes and spirit to the sacred in the ordinary moments and people of your life. As the parables prove, when we fail to see the holy in life, we may lose sight of the sacredness of life. What better lesson to reinforce during the *Lenten* season? There is a sign-up sheet in the Main Hallway offering two choices of day and time — Monday mornings (10:30-12:00) or Tuesday afternoons. You can purchase the book (\$15) in the Church Office.

PASTOR'S CORMER

Exploring God's Love and Forgiveness During Lent

The sights, sounds and smells of Christmas are behind us. However, the importance of Christ's birth and the impact of his life loom large as we approach Lent and prepare ourselves for marking the history altering events of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Lent this year begins on Wednesday, February 18 — Ash Wednesday. Lent is an important time of reflection, study and worship. It offers us the unique opportunity to focus on our need for a Savior and the ways in which Jesus' selfless love can change us if we open ourselves to the work of the Holy Spirit. To this end, intentional spiritual practices can be meaningful ways of exploring God's love and forgiveness during Lent.

Therefore, I would like to suggest that we each take the time to participate in a spiritual practice during Lent. One such practice is known as "daily examen."

Daily examen is a discipline of self-examination and repentance that gained popularity through the work of Ignatius of Loyola. Ignatius suggests participants of this practice start each day by listing the places of weakness in their lives which they hope to change. Then at midday, he encourages people to pause and take stock of how their personal actions are addressing or not addressing the weaknesses identified at the start of the day. The full examen takes place at the end of the day when the person considers how they may have experienced God's transforming power while also considering where they may have felt distant from God during the day paying special

attention to the weakness they identified at the beginning of the day. This time of examen also includes an intentional of prayer offering thanks for God's presence and a confession of the ways in which the believer has strayed from God's teachings. However, we may not all be ready for such a committed practice. For those looking for a meaningful but not as thorough approach to the daily examen, Rev. Sheldon W. Sorge suggest that," [An] entry-level practice might consist at first of taking time each evening in Lent to list the consolations and desolations of the day, lifting up to the Lord in prayers of thanksgiving, confession, and repentance. Some will find it helpful to share their consolations and desolations with friends or family members who serve as prayer partners; others will want to keep a daily journal listing the flow of consolations and desolations they have encountered."

Of course, there are many other spiritual practices available to us if the daily examen does not speak to you. However, I encourage you to consider how you might add a new discipline of prayer and reflection to your faith journey. Because by doing so during Lent, you will find the power of the cross and the hope of Jesus' resurrection impacting you in meaningfully fresh ways this Easter.

Mission Committee

When I was nominated to sit on Session in 2011, I was assigned to the *Mission Committee*. Since then I have become aware of the many wonderful programs that the *Mission Committee* sponsors. Allow me to explore a few of these programs from a list of many.

The *Homeless Ministry* is a unique and fulfilling opportunity for JAPC to serve our community. Over the years I have witnessed the impact that our efforts have on those less fortunate. When I sit and talk with our guests, I'm given a glimpse into their world and the struggles that they endure on a daily basis. It is rewarding to see how a small effort from each of us can have a large effect on those who are in need.

Although I have not been able to be an active participant in the *Tutoring T.R.E.E.*, I have gotten to see the impact it produces. When I've delivered the *Deacon's Christmas Baskets* to the families of the *Tutoring T.R.E.E.* students, I see the joy and excitement in the children's eyes. And the true sound of thankfulness in the adults "thank you". It is very rewarding. But that is just the icing on the cake. The true work of the *Tutoring T.R.E.E.* is conducted by numerous volunteers who nurture and mentor the students from Nichols school on a weekly basis.

The *Mission Committee* promotes the annual *Angel Tree* program for families impacted by the incarceration of a parent. Through the generosity of the entire JAPC family, we are able to provide Christmas gifts and clothing to those

children in the name of the absent parent. But that is not all. We invite these children and their caregivers into our church home and provide all with a nourishing lunch. With many volunteers we are able to have fun craft activities for the children. And, of course, Santa makes his jovial appearance and distributes the gifts to the children. The excited squeals of joy and the sparkle in the children's eyes says it all.

Don't think that Christmas is the only time that the *Mission Committee* is active. In cooperation with the *Parish Life Committee*, the *Fall Fun Fair* is sponsored. We reach out to children and families in our local area and entertain them with games and activities. The participants enjoy making picture frames for the instant photos we provide, face painting, games of skill and, of course, a wholesome meal.

There is one other activity that I would like to mention. The *Mission Committe*e and the Board of Deacons jointly sponsor a blood drive two times per year. Please understand that I am terrified of needles and getting poked. Yet I have learned that each unit of blood that we donate can help save up to three lives. Three for one is a pretty good investment if you ask me. And the momentary discomfort quickly fades away when the benefits are considered.

All-in-all, it is the support, dedication and generosity of the entire JAPC family that allows the *Mission Committee* to provide these and many other outreach opportunities. We are thankful to be blessed with such support.

I am currently on track to complete all of my seminary coursework by May and, following that, I have one year of field study remaining before I graduate with a Master's of Divinity. This year I am studying Greek, the history of the reformed tradition, early Christian history, Presbyterian history, religion and science, and more. The curriculum is challenging and it is incredibly interesting!

OUR MINISTRY IN MUSIC

In Memoriam: Kassarjian The Transfiguration of Christ" Sunday, February 15

On Sunday, February 15, the Chancel Choir will sing a piece composed by an old friend, Jackson Berkey. Jackson and his wife, Almeda, are both founding members of Mannheim Steamroller, and have also performed at our church with our choir at least four times. This composition was last performed by our choir a few years before I came to JAPC.

In Memoriam, commissioned by the Clarion Chamber Chorale of Omaha, Nebraska, sets an original text by Almeda Berkey narrating the complete biblical story of the Transfiguration. In addition to the text narrative, Jackson's choral setting and accompaniment serves to paint the text vividly with sonic images. Initially, the piece starts out very atmospherically, with the choir almost chanting the setting as a mantra. As Jesus is said to be "transfigured," the piano accompaniment builds in energy until the choir launches into a rhythmic, repeating declamation "Suddenly, suddenly, suddenly." The piece continues to pour on through the narrative with both incessant drive and soaring grandeur.

As is typical of one of Jackson's anthems, the first page is frightfully deceptive to the accompanist in judging its difficulty. While it starts out atmospheric and meditatively, by a few pages in, the pianist finds their score increasingly dense with ink; it is really a virtuoso piano score with added choir! Recently, I have started collaborating with a wonderful student at EMU named Michelle who has guest accompanied for our choir as well as worked for Ken and me on organ restoration in our shops. After hearing her wonderful playing at her Junior recital, I was sure she would be able to handle this anthem! I am very pleased to have her join our choir on the Sunday, February 15.

While Jesus had performed many miracles and signs, this particular narrative in the New Testament, (appearing in the ninth chapter of Mark and Luke, and the seventeenth chapter of Matthew), provides a depiction of Jesus in a super-natural state. It is also one of the only moments that the disciples hear the voice of God the Father. "This is my Song, whom I love. Listen to him!" (NIV) It is a glimmering and glorious moment on top of the mountain before we start our sevenweek long liturgical descent into the valley of *Lent*. I hope that our musical offering will provide a fair representation and evoke the emotional impact of God's word.

Hymn Singing Workshop Sunday, February 22

Many have given positive responses to our seasonal hymn singing workshops. As we have been proceeding, I have been attempting to touch on a variety of genres and sources for hymns old and new. In one of the future workshops, my hope is to simply have a good old hymns-sing! If you have any old favorites from your past that we haven't normally sung as a congregation, please send the title my way in the next month or so. Thanks again for your willingness to participate and stretch a little in your congregational singing!

JAZZ at JAPC Sunday, February 22

This month our *JAZZ at JAPC* series will feature award winning solo pianist, Taslimah Bey, in a program of Ragtime piano music! On her website, she expresses that Ragtime makes her "feel like home," both in how it evokes the energy of her family gatherings and in how the study of its composers provides a sense of connection and heritage. She has been a regular performer at Greenfield Village and has performed at several other Ragtime festivals and also formed her own Ragtime band. In May, 2001, Taslimah received the award for the Preservation of African-American Music from the Societie for the Culturally Concerned in Detroit. Recently, she had the opportunity to perform at Preservation Hall in New Orleans, and with the Preservation Hall Orchestra at the Blue Note in New York.
