PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear JAPC Friends,

This month's article was prompted by a conversation I had with a new member just this past Sunday. It went something like this: "Lou, since coming to JAPC we've been reading the Bible more, coming to Sunday morning Bible Study and also Bible and Brew. But I need some hints on what Bible to get and how to study."



So here goes:

STEP 1 — Materials. You have to have the right books and here are the basics:

- (1) a study Bible — one that has notes and helps. Get a translation that reads comfortably. New International Version (NIV), New Revised Standard Version (NRSV), New American Standard (NAS) are all good
- (2) a one volume Interpreters Commentary
- (3) a Pictorial Bible Dictionary. There you have it, three books.

STEP 2 — Reading. Read a passage of Scripture repeatedly until you understand its theme, and grasp the main truth of the passage. Divide longer books into short sections and read each section daily for 30 days.

STEP 3 — Interpreting. As you read Scripture, always keep in mind one simple question: "What does this mean? What is the writer saying to me and to my faith?"

STEP 4 — Background. The books of the Bible were written many centuries ago. For us to understand today what God was communicating then, there are several gaps that need to be bridged:

- **Language:** The Bible was originally written in Greek, Hebrew, and Aramaic. Often, understanding the meaning of a word or phrase in the original language can be the key to correctly interpreting a passage of Scripture. The Commentary will help here.
- **Culture:** Realize that Scripture must first be viewed in the context of the culture in which it was written. Without an understanding of first-century Jewish culture, it is difficult to understand the passage. The Dictionary and Commentary will help.
- **History:** Unlike the scriptures of most other world religions, the Bible contains the records of actual historical persons and events. An understanding of Bible history will help us place the people and events in it in their proper historical perspective. Again, a Bible Dictionary is useful here, as are basic historical studies.

STEP 5 — Applying. The bottom-line question to ask is, "How do the truths and principles contained in any passage apply to me in terms of my attitude and actions?" We must take the knowledge we have gained from our reading and interpretation and draw out the practical principles that apply to our personal lives.

If you ever looked at my own Bible you would see it's a mess because of the notes and scribbles on the pages dating back to 1971. It the most important book in the house by far. It teaches and guides me on how to forgive, love, speak, think, include, sing, worship and pray. We should know it well from cover to cover.

PARISH LIFE

The 42nd Annual Historic Indian Village Home & Garden Tour *Saturday, June 6, 10 a.m. – 5 p.m.* *& Sunday, June 7, 12 noon – 5 p.m.*

The *Historic Indian Village Home & Garden Tour* is celebrating the 120th anniversary of our elegant, historic neighborhood. This is the tour's 42nd year. It is the second oldest tour of its kind in Michigan, preceded only by the Marshall Michigan Historic Home Tour.

In the mid 1950s, the Women's Garden Club held many events in Indian Village. Their Garden Fair was a precursor to the current tour, which began its run in the 1960s and became an annual event in 1973. It is now sponsored by the Historic Indian Village Association (HIVA), the Indian Village Women's Garden Club and the Indian Village Men's Garden Club.

Today, the Indian Village community consists of 352 households, plus six churches, four elementary schools and one nursery school. This historic district includes Burns, Iroquois and Seminole Avenues from East Jefferson running one mile north to Mack Avenue.

Although there are features on many homes that fall into a distinct architectural style, Indian Village can best be described as eclectic. As is so typical of American independence, owners chose elements from different architectural styles when building their homes. Detroit's most distinguished architects designed Indian Village homes. Among them are Marcus Burrowes, Chittenden & Kotting, Albert Kahn, Louis Kamper, Rogers & MacFarlane, Smith Hinchman & Grylls, William B. Stratton, Leonard B. Willeke, George D. Mason, Robert O. Derrick and C. Howard Crane.

The church will be open for ticket sales, tours of the Sanctuary, music from the organ and carillon, a Used Book Sale and the Crafters' sale. Light refreshments will also be offered. We hope you will come, buy a book or two, purchase a crafter item, have some refreshments, and then tour our neighborhood.

Update On Interim Pastor Search

As this goes to press, the JAPC Interim Pastor Search Committee is continuing to interview Interim pastor candidates from all over the Country. The committee (Jon Christinidis, Jan O'Brien, Ron Huizenga, Marve Adams, Paul Booker, John Lovegren, Bruce Maters, and Kathi Johnson) has been working since late 2014 with the Presbytery of Detroit, meeting regularly and interviewing candidates by telephone and in person — the Committee corresponds several times each week by e-mail as well.

We're committed to hiring the best available interim pastor to lead this Congregation through the self-examination required to move our ministry forward and continue our 161 years of successful and meaningful ministry in the midst of Detroit. The process has been challenging — with its share of joys and disappointments. Our goal was to have an interim

pastor in place contemporaneously with Peter's departure. Despite our best efforts, the search continues.

But there is still much good news to report. We continue to see strong interest in JAPC from the interim pastoral community. And while we redouble our search efforts, our longtime Pastoral Associate Lou Prues has graciously accepted our offer to expand his role and become Church Administrator and Head of Staff for the brief period between Peter's departure and the hiring of an interim pastor. Church Secretary Margie Uysal has also taken on additional responsibilities. We appreciate their willingness to "step up" during this period of transition and we expect their efforts and renewed commitment to JAPC will energize the Congregation.

Thank you for your continuing confidence in our Congregation, our able Church Staff and the Interim Pastor Search Committee. Please lend a hand wherever you can in the coming months, love each other and embrace our exciting new journey.

Did You Know?

Each month one of the church's committees shares insights into its work and ministry.

The prime function of this committee is to encourage, promote, and oversee gifts to the church's Memorial Fund. These financial contributions are categorized as **Unrestricted**, or **Restricted**.

- **Unrestricted** — All unrestricted Memorial money gifts is channeled into the General Memorial Fund. There are no limitations or codicils as to its use. These monies may be used to support the spiritual vitality of the congregation and projects which would contribute to the church's life and ministry.
- **Restricted** — When a Memorial gift or bequest specifically directs how the principal and/or income is to be used, that gift is known as a Restricted Gift.

As part of its work, the committee maintains a record of financial contributions to the Memorial Fund. It develops annually a list of possible memorial projects, identifying sources of funding, researching the financial implications and insuring that items reflect the church's needs and objectives (and its architecture and history). It prepares a list of specific memorials for a deceased member's family to consider. It recommends and purchase memorial items. Finally it oversees the maintenance of items purchased with Memorial Gifts.

In the last sixteen months memorial gifts were received by the church in loving memory of Betty Glover, Cathy MacDonald, Richard Rapp, Nina Ryder, George Schumaker, Mary Lou Sloss and Mary Waterstone. These thoughtful remembrances enable the church to obtain items which

enhance our building, but more importantly, enrich our life and ministry. These gifts allow us to realize some hopes and dreams that could not (and should not) be funded through our operating budget.

2015 Carillon Series debuts Sunday, July 5

Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church welcomes Michelle Good of Eastern Michigan University and Patrick Macoska of St. Mary's of Redford Church to our **20th Summer Carillon Series**. Pat will provide music at our annual neighborhood concert on Tuesday, July 28, beginning at 7:30 p.m. The evening includes ice cream, other frozen desserts, cookies and beverages for guests, and all are welcome.



Architect and musician Pat Macoska is organist, choir director and carillonneur at St. Mary's of Redford on Grand River, where Pat also organizes a carillon series following 5 p.m. Saturday mass in July. The church has a 51-bell instrument from French bell founder Paccard. Pat has installed his first complete organ his alma mater, at St. Ignatius High School in Cleveland.

On Sunday, August 9, Michelle Good will play her first carillon program here, though she is no stranger to JAPC. Michelle has accompanied the choir, played a piano prelude for us this past year and has filled in on the carillon at recent worship services. An undergraduate at Eastern Michigan, Michelle is majoring in piano performance. She teaches piano privately and tutors in math, ear training and music theory. She also performs on organ, hammered dulcimer and harp. Michelle works with Stephen Warner on organ repairs and maintenance.



Our summer series opens Sunday, July 5, with a program by JAPC carillonneur Jenny King and featuring lots of patriotic tunes and Americana favorites to enjoy during the day's coffee hour.

Music Series

Season Conclusion on Sunday, June 14

On June 14, our music series will conclude with **A Night at the Theater** featuring our own chancel choir, soloists and friends. The concert will take a similar approach to our opera program a few years ago, with choruses and solo songs, each preceded by a plot summary to put them in context. Recently, Rose and I gave a concert of the music of Stephen Sondheim and his mentors, so we already have a great deal of material to work with! I will be getting all 30+ tons of our Skinner pipe organ up on its toes and dancing with Bernstein's *New York, New York*, from *On the Town*, and *America*, from *West Side Story*. Our chancel choir will be swooning the audience

with timeless favorites such as *Climb Every Mountain*, and *You'll Never Walk Alone*. They will also get a little more rhythmic with the favorite from *Rent*, *Seasons of Love*. We are fortunate that my predecessor, Phil Micheal, obtained a number of choral arrangements for a very creative liturgy utilizing musical theater songs a few years before I came onboard at JAPC. I am quite pleased to be able to put some of them to use again! Please join us on Sunday, June 14 for a very fun program!

JAPC's 1892 Organ Found!

Earlier this year, I was delighted to hear from a colleague that the 1892 Roosevelt Organ that our church had at the Rivard church was still extant! It had been purchased by and transplanted to Our Lady, Star of the Sea in Jackson, Michigan in 1926. Recently, I had the pleasure of going out to inspect it. Roosevelt, like Skinner, was one of the premium organ builders of their era. Interestingly, the founder of this New York City based company was a distant relative of Theodore Roosevelt! One of the unique things about Roosevelt is that he had a few patents for the telephone. This gave him an advantage of having considerable capital to operate his business and a much broader base of connections in industry. He was an associate of Thomas Edison and built the small organ that was in the laboratory in Menlo Park. (This organ was reproduced by Skinner for Greenfield Village.) Despite his success, a few years after our organ was built, the shop closed its doors because the founder felt he was done with the organ business. There is a fascinating pedigree of action evolution which progresses from Roosevelt, to Farrand and Votey of Detroit, builders of the Columbian Exposition Organ, and then to Aeolian, who built all the residence organs for the wealthy.



Roosevelt Opus 501 is a rich and powerful instrument of three manuals. The contract from Roosevelt states that some of the pipework is repurposed from JAPC's previous instrument, which means that there is some pipework from the late 1850s. The current configuration is split, where at the JAPC Newberry Chapel, it was all in one case. The Roosevelt had a recital played on it by Alexandre Guilmant in 1908, who toured the United States extensively after giving recitals at the famed Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. The instrument has had only minor tonal modifications and is playing from a newer console. They are faithfully working to keep it up and playing, yet it is likely it will require more extensive work in the near future.
